Wyoming Cancer Facts for Converse, Campbell, Crook,

Women age 40+ who have not had a mammogram within the last 2 years:

Campbell County: 38.7%
Crook County: 35.8%
Johnson County: 34.5%
Sheridan County: 31.4%

Women who have not had a Pap smear within the last 3 years:

Campbell County: 21.3%
Crook County: 35.5%
Johnson County: 21.3%
Sheridan County: 21.7%

People age 50+ who report they have not had a sigmoidoscopy or colonoscopy within the last 10 years:

Campbell County: 48.8%
Crook County: 51.7%
Johnson County: 47.5%
Sheridan County: 33.3%

Why Are Cancer Screenings Important?

Some types of cancer can be found before they cause symptoms. Checking for cancer (or for conditions that may lead to cancer) in people who have no symptoms is called “screening.”

Screenings can help doctors find and treat some types of cancer early. Generally, cancer treatment is more effective when the disease is found early.

Basic screening tests (mammograms, pap tests, colonoscopies) are used widely to check for cancers of the breast, cervix, colon and rectum.

Early detection of cancers through screenings saves lives!

What is Wyoming Cancer Resource Services (WCRS)?

The Wyoming Department of Health Comprehensive Cancer Control Program is committed to reducing the impact of cancer on all Wyoming citizens. As part of the statewide cancer control plan, the program has divided the state into 5 regions to implement regional-level cancer control through the use of the Wyoming Cancer Resource Service (WCRS) program.

The goal of each regional WCRS office is to:

- Increase the number of Wyoming residents who are being screened for cancer
- Decrease the number of Wyoming residents affected by cancer
- Decrease the number of Wyoming residents dying from cancer

What does WCRS do?

- Promote cancer awareness, prevention, and early detection based on current evidence based data.
- Provide Cancer education to policymakers, health care providers, and the general public
- Recruit eligible individuals into state-funded cancer screening programs.
- Serve as patient navigators to individuals needing local, regional, state, and national cancer information to include: *Screening services, financial assistance, provider and treatment information, support services*
- Improving access to screening and treatment services by identifying and linking with community resources
- Network with partners to advocate for cancer control within the region and throughout the state
- Collect essential data on communities with regard to cancer prevention and control
